

DOUBLE DEGREE IN GLOBAL STUDIES/TOURISM (study plan 3108GD124)

Enrolment Instructions

In accordance with the enrolment and academic continuity regulations of the University of Girona:

- You must enrol in all previously failed courses before enrolling in new ones. If you fail an elective course, you do not need to repeat it the following year — you may replace it with a different one. The new course will carry over the enrolment and examination attempt numbers corresponding to the replaced course. At the time of enrolment you will be asked to specify which course you wish to replace.
- The total number of credits for the degree is **347**
- The maximum number of credits you may enrol in per year is as set out in the double degree plan: 1st year (72), 2nd year (72 credits), 3rd year (67 credits), 4th year (72 credits), 5th year (64 credits).
- The minimum number of credits you must enrol in per year is 40% of the credits set out in the plan: 2nd year (29), 3rd year (26), 4th year (29) and 5th year (25).
- You have three examination attempts to pass each course (one per academic year). **A grade of "not present" uses up an attempt; therefore, in order not to have an attempt counted, you may apply for cancellation by the deadline set in the academic and administrative calendar for 2026/2027.**
ATTENTION: for scholarship purposes, a cancelled examination attempt counts as a failed course.

It is your responsibility to choose the courses and groups (if there is more than one).

- The Enrolment Regulations do not allow changes unless there have been timetable modifications. It is therefore very important that you carefully select your courses and especially your groups to avoid timetable conflicts. Pay close attention, especially if you are enrolling in courses from different years. **Review your timetable once enrolment is complete and make corrections if you detect any conflicts or errors.** The self-enrolment application allows modifications until 23:59 on the same day. After that time no further changes can be made.
- Corrections will only be accepted in well-justified and exceptional cases. A request must be submitted during the incidents period (7 to 30 July) through the online secretariat → Procedures → Request to the Administration.
- Places in course groups will be allocated in the order in which students enrol. Once all places have been filled, enrolment in that group will close.
- **Mobility students (Sicue/Erasmus/Prometeu): you only need to choose a group for the courses you will take at UdG.** Courses you will not take at UdG will appear by default in the Study Agreement (SA) group when you load them using the "study agreement" filter on the 2nd screen of the self-enrolment application.
- If you have any type of exemption (for example, large family status) you must ensure it is valid on the day you enrol. Remember that if you have renewed it during this academic year, you must upload it through the procedures tab in La Meva (Documentary Accreditation) before enrolling so that the relevant price exemption is applied.
- **Scholarships. We recommend you consult the UdG Scholarships Section website before enrolling.** There you will find information on both general scheme scholarships and equity grants <https://www.udg.edu/ca/estudia/Scholarships-i-ajuts/Scholarships-de-graus>. You may enrol conditionally on a scholarship if you have already applied for it and meet the academic requirements. Even if you received a scholarship in the previous year, we recommend that if you have any other type of exemption you also document it. If your scholarship is denied, we will be able to apply the relevant exemption.

LANGUAGE MODULE COURSES

You may only enrol in language module courses that have been validated by the academic secretariat and the language teachers (if you have not indicated otherwise, these are the ones shown in the personalised email sent in mid-June). If no language course appears in the self-enrolment application, you must complete enrolment without the language courses and submit a request during the incidents period (7 to 30 July) through the online secretariat → Procedures → Request to the Administration.

- Having a language course validated does not guarantee a place. Places are allocated in order of enrolment.
- To obtain the degree you must have passed 6 courses worth 6 credits each (36 credits) from the language module and meet two requirements (3rd and 4th language), which must include:
 - **English C1.1, the compulsory module course, which is the 3rd language requirement.**
 - And one of the following: French B1 or German B1.1, or a course at a higher level, which constitute the 4th language requirement.
- **Attention students coming from Higher Vocational Training Cycles (Travel Agencies and Event Management, Tourist Accommodation Management, Tourist Guide, Information and Assistance)** if you obtain recognition for the course Modern Languages Seminar I, it will count as one of the 6 courses you must complete. You must therefore meet the 3rd and 4th language requirements with only 5 courses.

Other considerations:

 - French and German begin at the initial level.
 - English begins at the B2.1 level. It is therefore advisable to have reached B1 level before starting the Tourism Degree
 - **English C1.1 and English C1.1 Plus correspond to the same level (C1.1) but with different content. English C1.1 must be taken first as it is the compulsory course.** English C1.1 Plus (elective) can be used to complement the 6 language courses.
 - Groups 1A, 1B, 1C and 1D correspond to 1st-semester courses and groups 2A, 2B, 2C and 2D correspond to 2nd-semester courses. The letters A, B, C and D indicate the course timetable. **Do not choose any language course in group 00, as this group is reserved for 1st-year students.**
 - **Do not enrol in a group you will be unable to attend; if no places are available, submit an incidents request to the academic secretariat.**

Second-semester courses must be included in the Study Agreement for international mobility.

ACADEMIC RECOGNITION (AR).

You will receive the 6 academic recognition credits through your international mobility period (1.5 AR credits per full month of mobility; therefore, with 4 full months of mobility you will receive the 6 AR credits).

Groups: Within groups there may be subgroups managed directly by the teaching staff (for Tourism courses). We recommend enrolling in all courses in the same group to avoid timetable conflicts.

Timetables: To build your class timetable, we recommend first choosing your language group and then the group for the rest of your courses. For example, if your language group is A, the group for the rest of your courses should also be A or EA (English-taught course). If you choose language group B, the rest of your courses should be B or EB (English-taught course). Groups C and D extend the schedules of language subjects to other time slots.

MODULE 5 ELECTIVES

In both the second and third year, you must take one Module 5 elective in the first semester. Module 5 has three elective subjects, offered on a rotating cycle: each year, two of the three will be available. The forecast for the coming years is as follows:

- 2026–2027: Communication Techniques and Data Interpretation and Visualization
- 2027–2028: Data Interpretation and Visualization and Research Methods
- 2028–2029: Research Methods and Communication Techniques

Since over the course of the degree you will need to take two of these three electives (one in the second year and one in the third year), we recommend that you consult the availability forecast in advance and plan which subjects you wish to take, bearing in mind that the same subjects will not be available every year.

SPECIALISATIONS

The Global Studies study plan includes 5 specialisations: Social Communication (SC), Regional Development (RD), Political Advocacy and Action (PAA), Inclusivity and Gender (IG) and Spatial Mobility (SM). To obtain a specialisation you must complete 48 specific ECTS:

- 12 elective credits from modules 3 and 4
- 12 elective credits from module 8
- 12 curricular placement credits
- 12 credits for the 4th-year Service-Learning project (Rethinking Project)

When selecting your third-year elective courses, consider whether you wish to pursue any of the available specialisations upon completing the degree, as the electives in modules 3 and 4 are designed to meet the requirements of each specialisation. The following table shows which courses count towards each one:
